Re: HEALTH Supplemental Guidance on HIV Pre-Exposure Prophylaxis (PrEP)

Please be advised and share with your colleagues this important information:

Last month, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) released an <u>Interim Guidance for</u> <u>Clinicians on HIV Pre-Exposure Prophylaxis (PrEP)</u>. While it is extremely important to note that <u>PrEP should be delivered as part of a comprehensive package of prevention services</u>, including HIV testing, discussing sexual health to reduce risk behavior, access to condoms, and management of other sexually transmitted infections, PrEP offers an additional prevention tool.

HEALTH recommendations:

- Identify adult men who have sex with men (MSM) and heterosexually-active men and women who are eligible for PrEP.
- Consult the CDC's fact sheet <u>PrEP: A New Tool for HIV Prevention</u> and <u>interim guidelines</u> <u>for clinicians.</u>
- Consider pre-exposure prophylaxis for those at high risk for HIV acquisition through sex:
 - People with partners who have known HIV infections
 - People who have frequent unprotected sex and abuse drugs and/or alcohol
 - People who have sex in exchange for money
 - People with frequent sexually transmitted diseases
- For higher risk patients as described above who receive PrEP, test each person for HIV at baseline, and repeat testing every two to three months.
