Rhode Island Board of Licensure for Physician Assistants 2020 Annual Report

Introduction

The world was unexpectedly disrupted in 2020 by the COVID-19 pandemic caused by Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome Coronavirus 2 (SARS-CoV2). The pandemic has had, and still has, broad impact in Rhode Island and the United States. Every aspect of the Rhode Island Department of Health (RIDOH) was affected, including all professional boards.

Rhode Island saw its first COVID-19 patient on February 28, 2020, and the Governor declared a State of Emergency on March 9, 2020. Among the changes necessitated by the pandemic was the requirement that professional boards meet virtually, via an online meeting platform or via conference call. The Physician Assistant (PA) Board shifted to meeting via ZOOM.

Despite the pandemic, Licensing Boards serve an important role in protecting the public, including the issuance of emergency licenses. Assurance of a competent workforce is one the 10 essential public health services recognized by the CDCⁱ.

Board members possess unique technical expertise and function within a Just Culture, as they exercise this duty. Complex issues that surround complaint investigations, health policy, establishment of rules and regulations, and issuing licenses are some examples of these important duties.

The mission of the Rhode Island Board of Licensure of Physician Assistants (PA Board) is to protect the public through enforcement of standards for medical licensure and ongoing clinical competence. The PA Board has seven members—three of whom are PAs, two are physicians, and two who are members of the public who are not physicians. Board members receive no compensation of any type for their hours of service annually.

The PA Board is housed entirely within RIDOH and is staffed by RIDOH employees who divide their time to effectively ensure the Board has the resources it needs to function at the highest level.

Licensing

Licensing of PAs by examination or by endorsement represents one of the essential functions of the PA Board. Ensuring that PAs who are allowed to practice medicine in Rhode Island are competent, ethical, and professional is critical to the licensing process.

Just Culture

Health equity and justice extends to all areas of RIDOH, so codifying Just Cultureⁱⁱ was a natural extension of this leadership vision that was accomplished in 2019. The PA Board continues utilizing the framework approved in 2019 regarding Just Culture.

The PA Board continues to utilize the Deliberate Harm Test, Incapacity Test, Foresight Test and Substitution Test to evaluate each new complaint, regardless of origin. These tests are based on lessons learned from other industries that evaluate errors and mistakes in the context of safety and Just Culture.ⁱⁱⁱ

The PA Board investigates complaints and strives to achieve consistent and just outcomes for all parties involved. The Board needs to determine when to hold a PA accountable or was the error/issue more likely caused by systems issues beyond the control of the PA. Utilizing the Deliberate Harm Test, Incapacity Test, Foresight Test and Substitution Test help the Board arrive at consistent decisions which protect the public, yet also hold physicians accountable.

Often, when a complaint is filed, there is a desire on the part of the complainant to assign blame. The framework the PA Board has adopted better helps determine if the PA is indeed blameworthy or if larger systems issues are at the root of the issue and therefore the physician is blameless.

Rules and Regulations for Licensure of Physician Assistants

There were no changes to the Rules and Regulations for PAs in 2020; however, changes are anticipated in 2021.

Complaints and Disciplinary Actions

An essential role of the PA Board is to investigate and adjudicate complaints. Complaints come from a variety of sources, including patients, patient advocates, notices of litigation, licensed facilities, pharmacists, physicians, and other healthcare professionals. Each complaint is reviewed prior to being opened for complete investigation. The complaint process for PAs is detailed in a flow chart at http://health.ri.gov/complaints/physician/.

Revenue

License fees account for the majority of revenue for the state as reflected in the table., all revenue is deposited in the General Treasury account. PA licenses are renewed by June 30 of odd years, so revenue varies significantly between renewal cycles. Revenue is also generated by fees paid to renew controlled substance registrations. There is a fee for verification of a Rhode Island PA license which sends real-time license verification to state medical boards as requested. RIDOH does offer primary source verification at no charge, at

The PA Board is not authorized to issue fines for disciplinary actions, and is one of the few states in the country that lacks this authority. The PA Board does have the authority to issue administrative fees which reflect the actual cost of investigating a complaint.
