

# Plastic Straws in Rhode Island

# What You Need to Know

Single-use plastic straws can be a source of waste and litter. Under Rhode Island law, food service establishments cannot provide a single-use plastic straw to a customer unless asked.

Waiting until a customer asks for a straw can help lower plastic waste, while meeting customer needs and preferences. It's important to remember that people with certain medical or physical conditions may need a straw to drink a beverage.

## **Single-Use Plastic Straw Definition**

A single-use, disposable tube made mostly from plastic that is used for drinking purposes



## **Acceptable Alternatives to Plastic Straws**

Straws made from non-plastic materials are not impacted and may be distributed as normal.

## **Frequently Asked Questions**

#### Are plastic straws banned in Rhode Island food service establishments?

Plastic straws are not banned. Food service establishments can no longer provide a plastic straw unless a customer asks for one. They are able to provide non-plastic straws without being asked and may provide a plastic straw if a customer requests one.

### Can a food service establishment have plastic straws available to the public in a dispenser or other self-serve display?

Plastic straws can only be provided if a customer asks for one. Plastic straws cannot be available to the public in a self-serve dispenser or display. Non-plastic straws can be available in a self-serve dispenser or display.

#### How do I know if a straw is considered a single-use plastic straw under the law?

Straws that are intended to be used once and disposed of are considered single-use straws. Straws made of plastic include plastic derived from either petroleum or a biologically based polymer, such as corn or other plant sources. It does not include a straw made from non-plastic materials.

## **Enforcement**

The Rhode Island Department of Health is responsible for enforcing this law and issuing violations. Food service establishments will be educated on the law's requirements and may receive a written notice for the first and second violation. After the second violation, the establishment will be fined.

- First violation: Notice of violation
- Second violation: Notice of violation
- Additional violations: \$25 fine for each additional violation (not to exceed \$300 annually)
